Introduction

Features and Functions

 - ⇒ Control from front panel or any combination of six (up to 12 if used with AAE) APAD LCD controllers or C2N-DBF12 12-button room keypads
 - ⇒ Built-in support for (1) Interface for Apple iPod® (CEN-IDOC), (1) AAE and (1) Adagio Audio Server (AAS)
- 45 watts per channel for six rooms, expandable to 24 rooms with additional AAEs
- Four inputs for line-level audio sources
- Front panel control provides flexible control of whole-house audio
- Control audio functions from the built-in LCD-driven front panel, 12-button room keypads, or APAD LCD controllers. Other control devices can be used with additional programming
- Two built-in AM/FM radio tuners with RDS/RBDS¹ (one AM/FM tuner on AADS-XM)
- XM^{®2} Satellite Radio (AADS-XM)

Multi-Room Audio

The AADS supports up to six sets of stereo room speakers, allowing listeners in each room to listen selectively to any of six different stereo sources. Its integrated multi-channel power amplifier delivers a robust 45 watts per channel to all rooms. Without requiring any programming, the AADS can easily be expanded to support a total of 12 rooms by adding an AAE Audio Expander. Or, as many as 24 rooms can be handled using three AAEs with simple setup provided by Crestron Adagio Composer software.

High-End Performance

An advanced Class G amplifier topology produces the great sound of a classic Class AB design with near-digital efficiency. A massive MOH-core toroidal power transformer directs pure, continuous power to each channel, achieving exceptional dynamic range and low distortion sound quality in every room. Gentle power-up is achieved through a “soft-start” inrush current limiting circuit, and quick-response output protection on each channel prevents failure caused by speaker line faults and overheating.

Front Panel Control

The AADS's front panel provides for controlling audio to a houseful of speakers, with custom naming of rooms and sources facilitated on the LCD display. The six room select buttons can also be custom labeled using Crestron Engraver software.

Preset Groups

The "Group" feature makes it simple to combine speakers in adjacent rooms, or switch into whole-house party mode, by letting the user link any number of rooms to function as one. Grouping lets you easily route one source to multiple rooms at once without the sync problems common to streaming-based systems. Up to six groups can be defined within the *Preset* mode.

Versatile Room Controls

A choice of basic 12-button keypads or the advanced APAD Wall Mount LCD Controller enables versatile control of the AADS in every room. A keypad provides the essential controls for adjusting volume, selecting sources, and toggling up and down through tracks and radio channels. For more elegant control, the APAD provides true feedback for display of audio sources, radio stations, CD titles, artists, and tracks by name, plus audio settings and many other parameters.

Dual AM/FM Radio, XM Radio, and MP3 Audio Servers

Two built-in AM/FM radio tuners let listeners in different rooms each enjoy their own choice of music, news, sports and talk. RDS/RBDS enables the display of the full radio station name and other detailed information about the song or program that is selected.

The AADS-XM includes an XM Satellite Radio tuner for additional programming variety.

In addition to radio, four line-level inputs are provided to accommodate external audio sources including Crestron's AAS Audio Server and CEN-IDOC Interface for Apple iPod. Plug-and-play compatibility with the AAS and CEN-IDOC delivers instant access to an entire collection of music from any room in the house with fully-bidirectional communications for browsing by album, artist, and song title.

2-Series Ethernet Control System

At the heart of the AADS is the powerful 2-Series control engine. With both Cresnet® and Ethernet connectivity, plus custom programmability using Crestron SystemBuilder™ software, the AADS allows nearly limitless expansion and customization using Crestron's entire line of touchpanels, wireless remotes, and hundreds of other devices. The built-in Web server with native e-Control®2 XPanel support enables full remote control over IP from computers and PDA devices, as well as remote diagnostics and updates. Built-in IR and RS-232 ports are included to interface the AADS with non-Crestron devices ranging from CD changers to security systems.

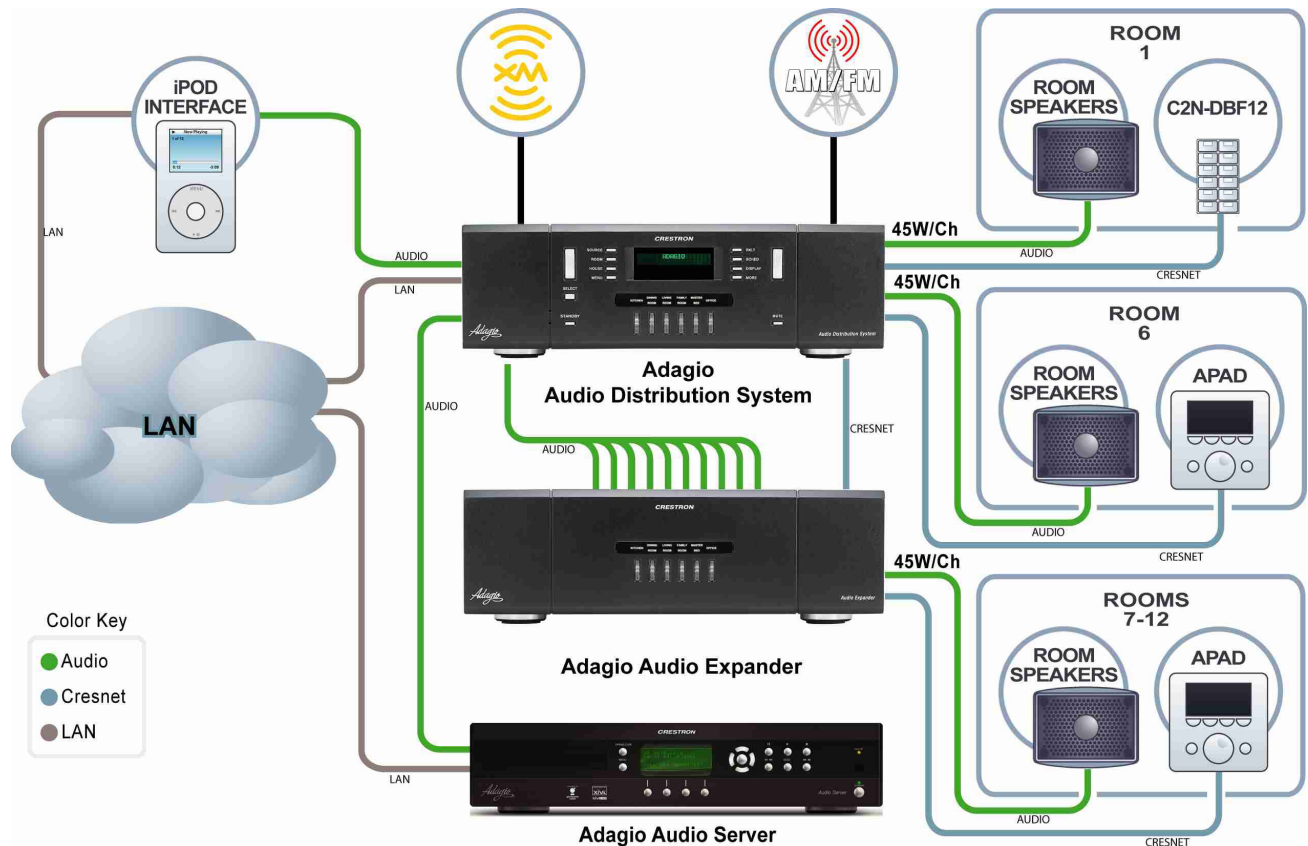
Home Automation and Integration

The AADS can grow as part of a complete home automation solution supporting all of Crestron's Cresnet and iNET™ controllable dimmers, shade controllers, thermostats, and so much more.

Available models are:

- AADS: AADS with built-in dual AM/FM tuner
- AADS-XM: AADS with built-in AM/FM/XM tuner
- AADSI: AADS for International (230 VAC) use with built-in AM/FM tuner

Out of the box, the AADS can support one AAS (Adagio Audio Server), one AAE (Adagio Audio Expander) for control of up to 12 zones, one CEN-IDOC (Interface for Apple® iPod), and a combination of up to 12 C2N-DBF12 (12-button keypads) or APAD controllers for local control of each zone.

With custom programming (via Adagio Composer, Crestron SystemBuilder™, or SIMPL™ Windows®) additional Crestron and third-party devices may also be added.

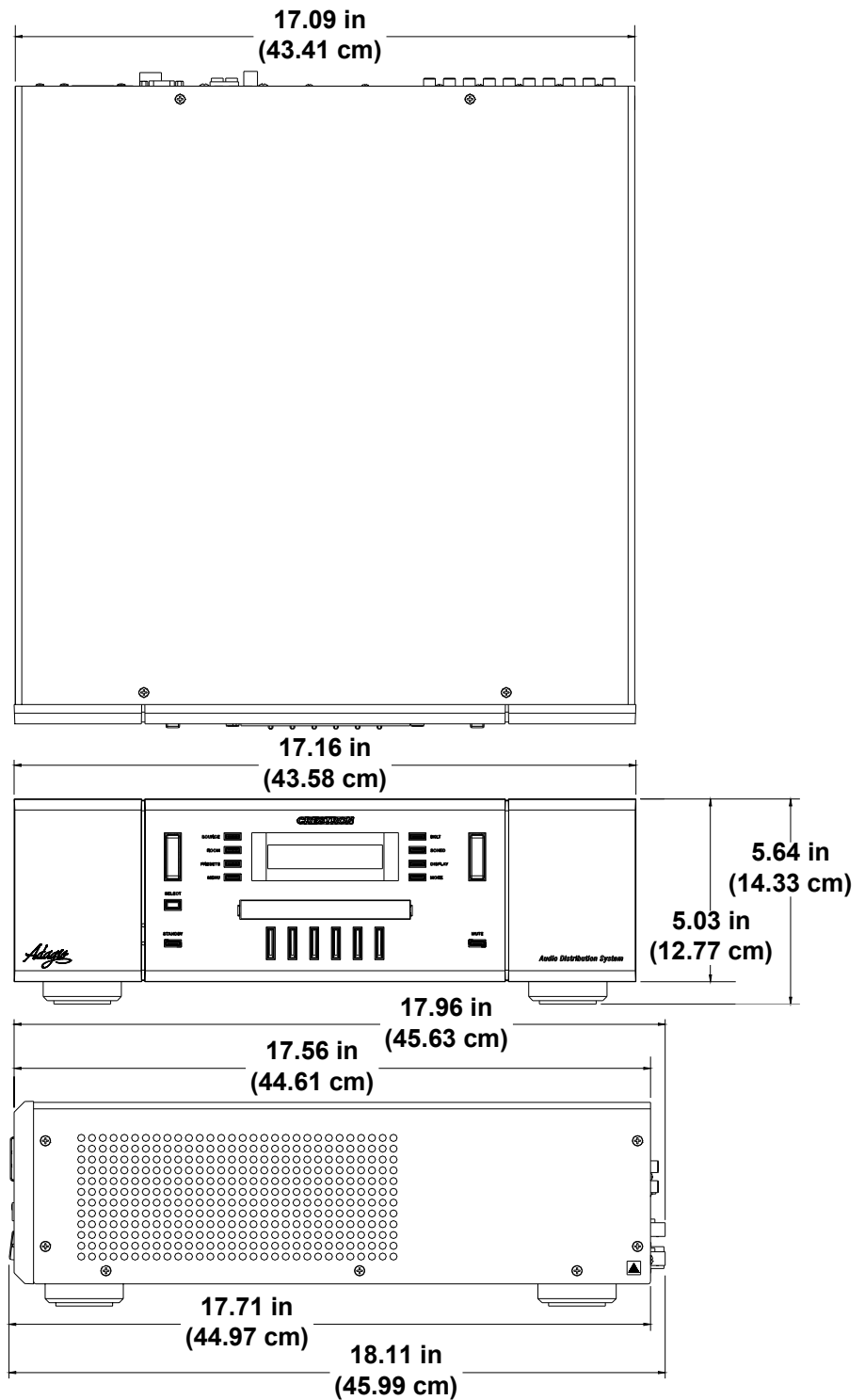
AADS Physical View (Rear),



AADS-XM Physical View (Rear),

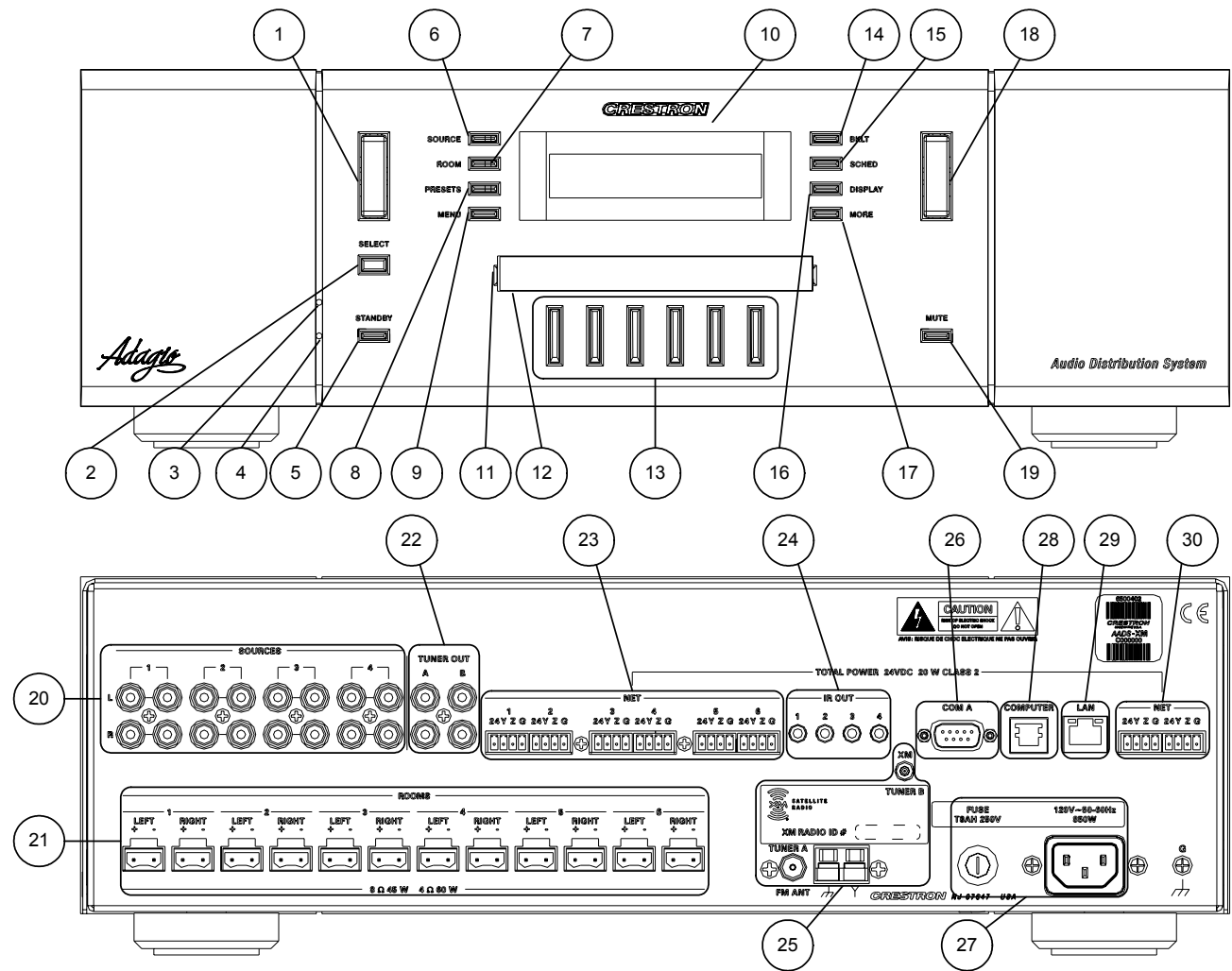


AADS Overall Dimensions




1	SELECTION CONTROL 	Used to select rooms, sources, and radio stations (when using tuner).
2	SELECT BUTTON SELECT 	The SELECT button confirms changes made to AADS settings.




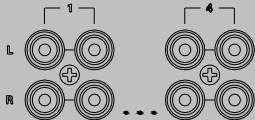
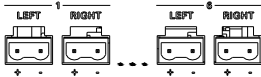
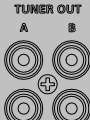
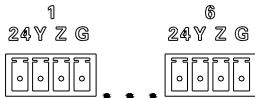

#	CONNECTORS, CONTROLS, & INDICATORS ¹	DESCRIPTION
3	HARDWARE RESET 	Recessed below the front panel. Press this button to initiate a system hardware reset. This has the same effect as disconnecting and reconnecting power.
4	SOFTWARE RESET 	Recessed below the front panel. Press this button while the system is running to restart the program without rebooting the processor. Hold during reboot to bypass the custom program and run the built-in out-of-the-box functionality.
5	STANDBY BUTTON STANDBY 	The STANDBY button places the unit in <i>Standby</i> . The button is lit when the AADS is in use. When in <i>Standby</i> , the button will not be lit, all switching connections are broken, and all of the amplifier and pre-amplifier outputs are powered off. Turning on a room turns on the AADS.
6	SOURCE BUTTON SOURCE 	The SOURCE button places the AADS in the <i>Source</i> mode.
7	ROOM BUTTON ROOM 	The ROOM button places the AADS in the <i>Room</i> mode.
8	PRESETS BUTTON PRESETS 	Used to configure and select preset groups.
9	MENU BUTTON MENU 	The MENU button returns the display (#10) to the previous screen.
10	LIQUID CRYSTAL DISPLAY	The Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) shows system information such as audio controls, tuner controls, and room controls.
11	LABEL ACCESS	A notch in the front panel allows removal of the label cover with a flat-head screwdriver.
12	LABEL STRIP COVER	Covers the engraved label strip.
13	ROOM BUTTONS 	Room buttons select and indicate the room(s) controlled by the AADS. Room buttons also indicate rooms contained in a room group.
14	BKLT  BKLT	The BKLT button adjusts the display and key backlighting to one of three levels (high, medium, low).
15	SCHED  SCHED	The SCHED button places the AADS in the <i>Schedule</i> mode that is programmed in SystemBuilder.
16	DISPLAY  DISPLAY	The DISPLAY button toggles the information shown on the display (i.e. artist and/or song title).


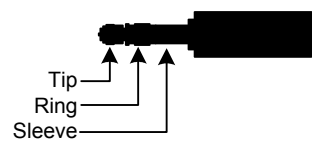
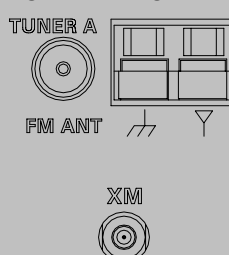
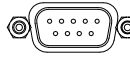

Setup

Network Wiring

When wiring the AAE Adagio Audio Expander, APAD controller, or C2N-DBF12 keypad to the AADS, consider the following:

- Use Crestron Certified Wire.
- Use Crestron power supplies for Crestron equipment.
- Provide sufficient power to the system.

CAUTION: Insufficient power can lead to unpredictable results or damage to the equipment. Please use the Crestron Power Calculator to help calculate how much power is needed for the system (<http://www.crestron.com/calculators>).

- For larger networks, Use a Cresnet Hub/Repeater (CNXHUB) to maintain signal quality

Hardware Hookup

Ventilation

The AADS should be used in a well-ventilated area. The venting holes should not be obstructed under any circumstances. If the AADS is hot to the touch, consider using forced air ventilation and/or incrementing the spacing between units.

To prevent overheating, do not operate this product in an area that exceeds the environmental temperature range listed in the table of specifications. Consideration must be given if installed in a closed or multi-unit rack assembly since the operating ambient temperature of the rack environment may be greater than the room ambient. Contact with thermal insulating materials should be avoided on all sides of the unit.

Out-of-the-box Connections

WARNING: To prevent injury and / or equipment damage due to electric shock, disconnect power from the AADS prior to making any wiring connections.

When using the out-of-the-box functionality, the AADS can support up to one AAE, one CEN-IDOC, one AAS-1/-2/-4, and any combination of six APAD or C2N-DBF12 control devices (plus an additional six on the AAE if connected). Observe the following when connecting hardware to the AADS.

- CEN-IDOC (Optional): The audio output of the CEN-IDOC must be connected to source input port 4 on the AADS when using the out-of-the-box configuration. The CEN-IDOC and AADS must be connected to the same DHCP router.
- AAS Devices (Optional): Source input ports 1 through 3 are reserved for the different variations of the AAS. The AAS and AADS must be connected to the same DHCP router.
 - ⇒ AAS-1: The audio output of the AAS-1 must be connected to source input port 1.

- ⇒ AAS-2: Audio output A of the AAS-2 must be connected to source input port 1 and audio output B must be connected to source input port 2.
- ⇒ AAS-4: Audio output A of the AAS-4 must be connected to source input port 1. Audio output B must be connected to source input port 2. Audio output C must be connected to source input port 3. Audio output D must be connected to source input port 4.

NOTE: If a CEN-IDOC is part of the system, audio output D cannot be used since the CEN-IDOC is connected to source input port 4.

- Control Devices (Optional): Any combination of six APADs or C2N-DBF12 devices can be connected to any of the six NET ports on the rear of the AADS. If an AAE is connected, six more APADs or C2N-DBF12 devices can be connected.
- AAE (Optional): One AAE can be connected to the AADS' loop-through ports and tuner outputs.

NOTE: When using the out-of-the-box functionality, the Net ID of the AAE is automatically set to its default value (31) when identifying keypads (refer to page 28). For information on other methods of setting the AAE's Net ID, refer to the latest version of the AAE guide (Doc. 6460) which is available from the Crestron website (www.crestron.com/manuals).

The connections shown in the following diagram must be made for the AADS to properly control and switch connected devices when using the out-of-the-box functionality.

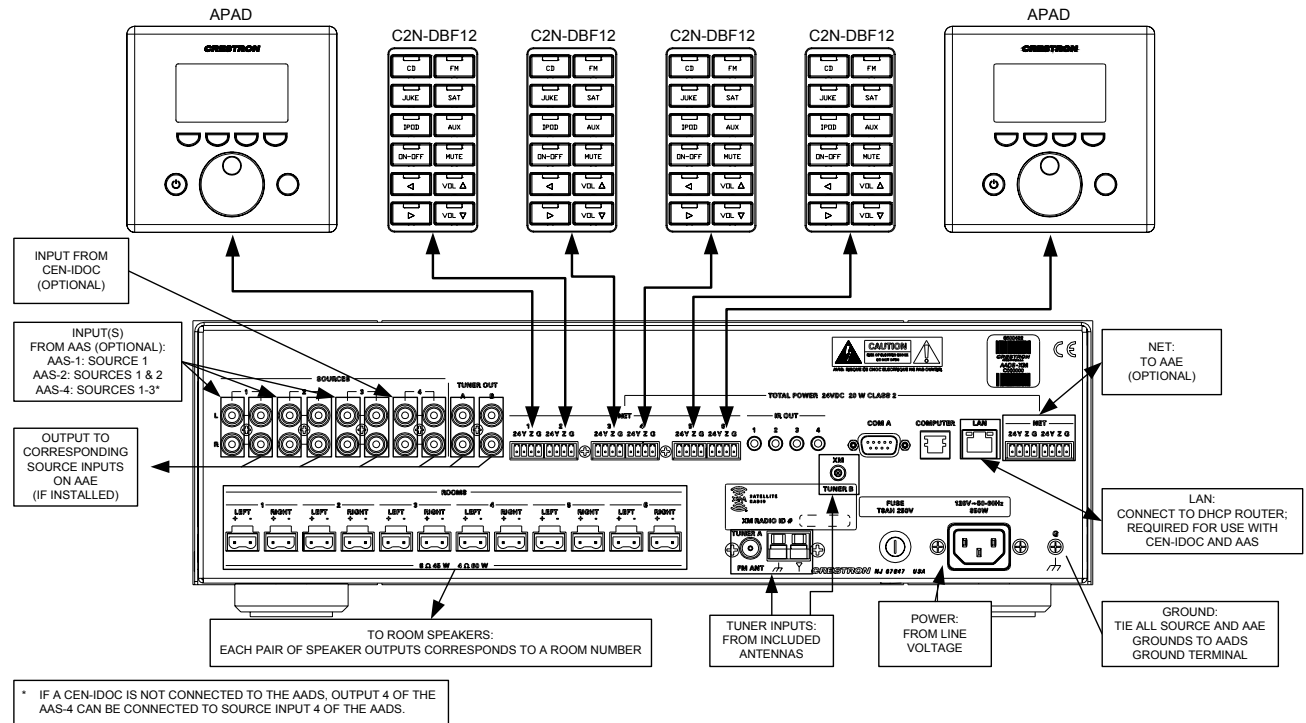

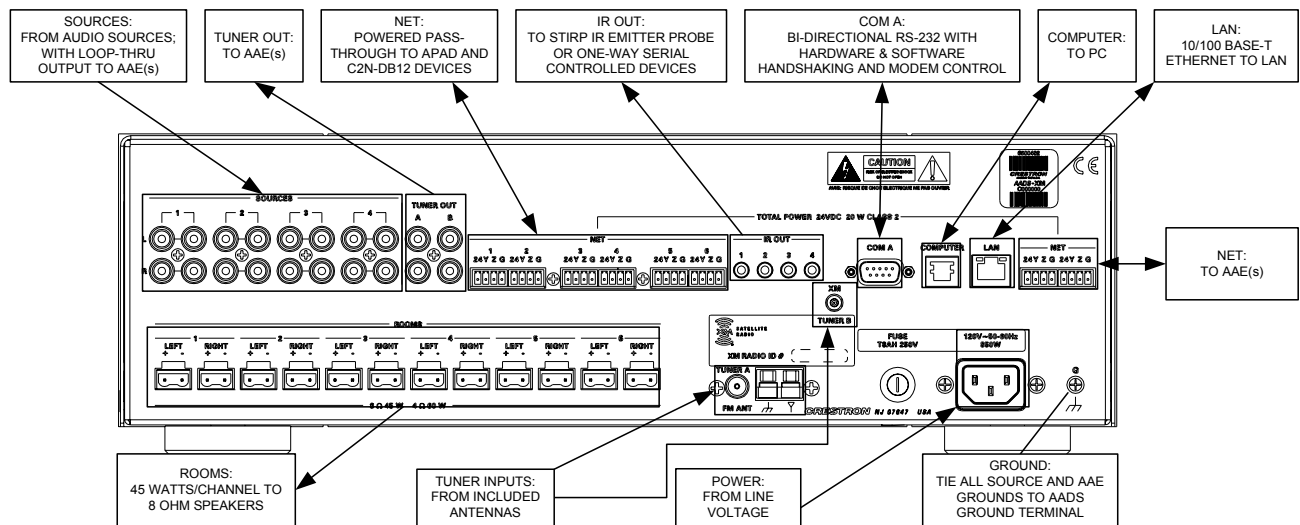

Antennas

The AADS and AADSI are equipped with two AM/FM tuners while the AADS-XM is equipped with an AM/FM tuner and an XM Satellite tuner.

The following antennas are supplied with AADS, AADSI, and AADS-XM:

For proper operation, the included antennas must be connected and oriented for optimum reception.

Connect Antennas

Connect the supplied AM antenna(s) by connecting the shield of the antenna wire to the connector's ground input and the inner conductor of the antenna wire to the connector's signal input.

Connect the supplied FM antenna or an outdoor antenna with the supplied conversion connector to the connector's signal input.

Connect the supplied XM antenna to receive XM radio signals (AADS-XM only).

Orient the Antennas

Once the antennas have been connected, it may be necessary to orient the AM loop antenna so that the flat surface of the loop antenna faces the metropolitan area originating the broadcast signals. This is particularly necessary when signals are weak. If you are not aware of the source or directions of the signals to which you will listen, simply rotate the loop antenna in clear space for maximum signal strength. The supplied antenna has a folding stand that allows you to place the antenna on a flat surface.

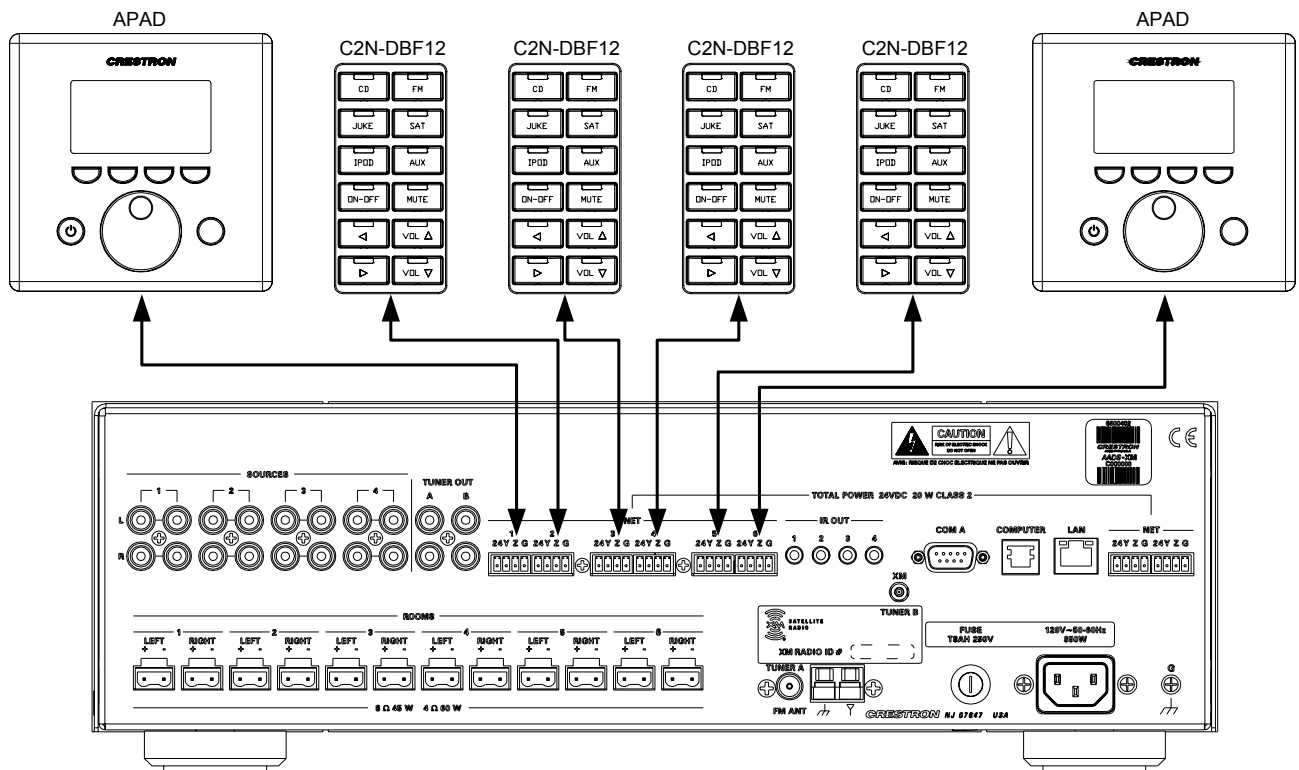
The recommended FM antenna is an outdoor type, commonly available in electronics stores. Use of the supplied indoor FM antenna is recommended only if you cannot use an outdoor antenna. Outdoor antennas are particularly needed in rural areas, some distance from FM radio signal sources. The FM antenna supplied with the AADS is a T-type, and it should be stretched horizontally in space that is as clear as possible. Some reorientation may be necessary if signals in your area are weak. Best results usually can be achieved if the length of the antenna faces the metropolitan area originating the FM signals that you wish to receive. The supplied antenna has a fitting at its end that will enable you to fasten it in place.

For XM operation, the antenna should be oriented toward the southern sky where the satellite is located. If the antenna is placed outdoors, it should be in an area where there are no obstacles within 20 to 60 degrees of elevation facing the southern sky. The antenna should be placed on a flat surface that is parallel to the ground. If the antenna is placed where obstacles such as buildings or trees are in the path to the satellite, the antenna may not receive radio signals from the satellite. Certain areas provide satellite radio ground repeaters that retransmit satellite radio signals. Antenna extension cables are available from your dealer or from Crestron.

AADS Control Devices

Any combination of six AADS control devices such as the APAD or the C2N-DBF12 can be simultaneously connected to the powered NET ports located on the middle of the rear panel. Refer to the following diagram and “Network Wiring” on page 16 for wiring information when connecting either APAD devices or C2N-DBF12 keypads.

Fuse Replacement

If the AADS does not power up when it is plugged into an AC outlet, the fuse may need to be replaced. The fuse holder is located on bottom-right of the rear panel (next to the power cord connector).

To replace the fuse:

1. Press **STANDBY** to place the unit in *Standby* and remove the power cable.
2. Use a flat-head screwdriver to push in the fuse holder. While pushing in the fuse holder, turn screwdriver counterclockwise until the fuse holder pops out.
3. Remove the fuse from the fuse holder and insert a new fuse.

CAUTION: Only use the specified type of fuse when replacing a blown fuse. Failure to do so may cause damage to the AADS.

4. Insert the fuse holder into the AADS.
5. Push in the fuse holder with a flat head screwdriver. While pushing in the fuse holder, turn the screwdriver clockwise until the fuse holder sinks in.
6. Push in the fuse holder a little further and turn the screwdriver clockwise until the fuse holder locks in place.
7. Connect power to the AADS.

Room Button Labels

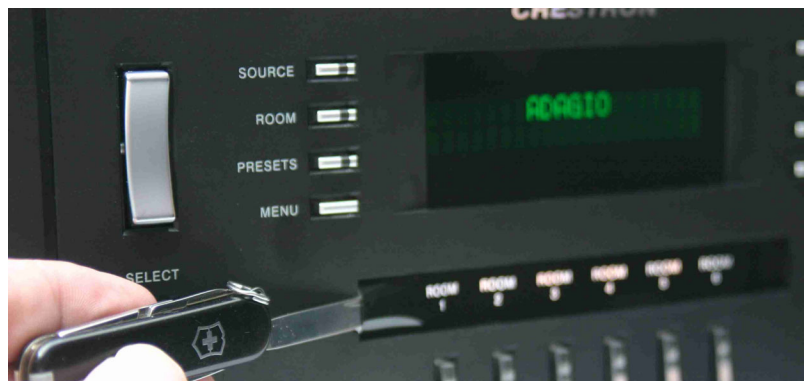
Use Adagio Composer or Crestron Engraver software to create and print custom labels on overhead transparency film for the AADS' room buttons.

NOTE: When printing custom labels, some experimentation may be required for optimum results.

Custom-engraved labels can also be ordered from Crestron. Contact Crestron for more information.

To remove the label:

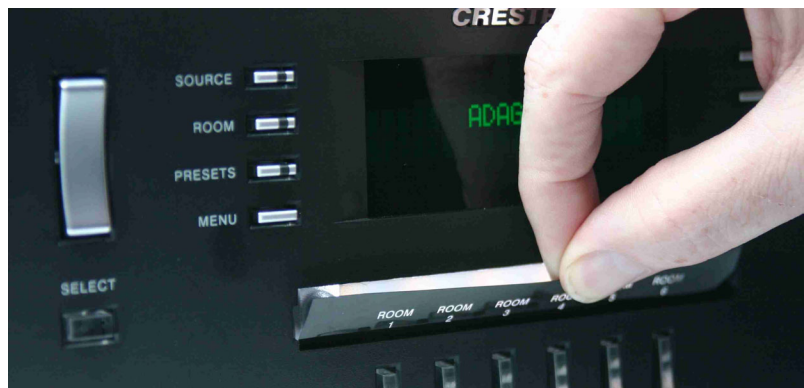
1. Remove the label cover with a small, flat-head screwdriver. The label cover is magnetically attached to the front panel of the Adagio component. The label strip will be exposed.
2. Insert the screwdriver behind the label strip as shown below.



3. Continue sliding the screwdriver behind the label strip until the top of the label strip slides out as shown in the following picture.



4. Continue sliding the screwdriver until the entire top of the label strip is visible. Remove the label strip by pulling the top of the label strip up from the Adagio component as shown below.



To install the new label:

- Engraved Label Cover: Place the engraved label cover over the label area of the Adagio component until the label cover's integrated magnets snap the label cover into place.
- Printed Label: Place the bottom of the label strip into the Adagio component. Bend the label strip and position the top of the label strip into the Adagio component. Replace the label cover over the new label strip.

NOTE: Observe proper orientation so the letters are right-side up.

Configuration

After making all hardware connections to the AADS, the system must be configured for operation.

Configuring the system is broken down into four processes:

- Configure the AADS for Operation
- Configure Sources
- Configure Rooms
- Configure Preset Groups

Configure the AADS for Operation

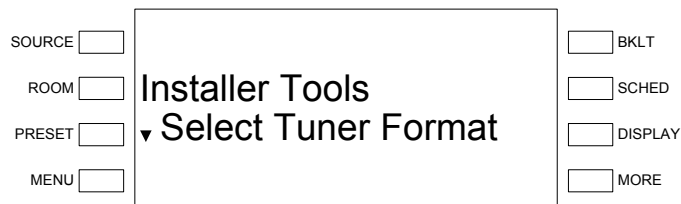
The AADS must be configured for operation prior to configuring sources, rooms, or groups. Use the Installer Tools to configure the AADS for operation.

NOTE: If a custom program was created with Adagio Composer or SystemBuilder, the following is not required.

Open Installer Tools

- Press and hold the **ROOM** and **SOURCE** buttons for five seconds to open the Installer Tools menu.

- Scroll through the list of available options by pressing up or down on the selection control. Arrows indicate available directions (up or down). The selected option will be displayed. Available options are:
 - ⇒ Select Tuner Format – Specifies the North American or European tuning format for the AM/FM tuner.
 - ⇒ Configure Network – Configures the AADS to communicate with devices that are connected to the AADS over Ethernet.
 - ⇒ Set Number of Rooms – Sets the number of rooms to be controlled by the AADS.
 - ⇒ Name Rooms – Allows custom naming of rooms controlled by the AADS.
 - ⇒ Name Sources – Allows custom naming of audio sources connected to the AADS.
 - ⇒ Hide Sources – Hides sources that are not used from the source list.
 - ⇒ Identify Keypads – Registers APAD devices and C2N-DBF12 keypads that are connected to the system.

- ⇒ Configure Keypads – Configures the source assignments of the top six buttons of every C2N-DBF12 keypad that is connected to the system.
- ⇒ Restore Defaults – Restores default settings
- ⇒ System Information – Provides information about the AADS such as IP data, firmware version, and program information.

To configure the displayed option, press the **SELECT** button.

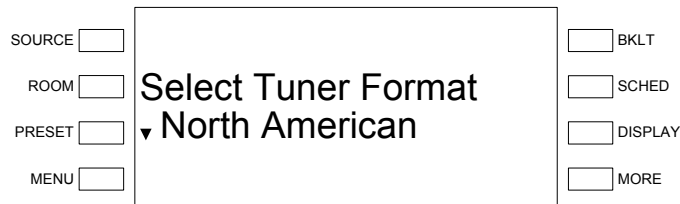
To exit Installer Tools and save changes to the AADS' configuration, press the **MENU** button.

Select Tuner Format

Select the tuning format to specify the tuning method used by an installed AM/FM tuner. When using the North American tuner format, the tuner will tune FM frequencies in 100 kHz steps and AM frequencies in 10 kHz steps. When using the European tuner format, the tuner will tune FM frequencies in 50 kHz steps and AM frequencies in 9kHz steps.

- Open Installer Tools as described on page 23, select **Select Tuner Format**, and press the **SELECT** button

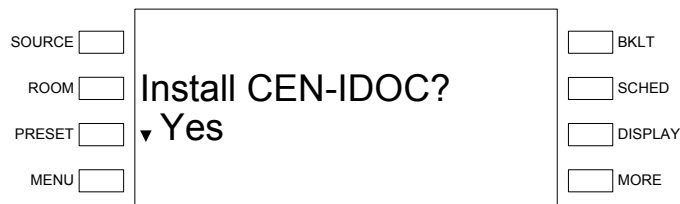
- To select a tuner format, press the selection control up or down to display the desired tuner format and press **SELECT**. To cancel and return to the Installer Tools menu, press the **MENU** button.

Configure the Network

The AADS must be configured to recognize devices that communicate over Ethernet (i.e. AAS, CEN-IDOC).

- Open Installer Tools as described on page 23, select **Configure Network**, and press the **SELECT** button. The AADS will poll the network to find compatible devices.

- To install a CEN-IDOC, press the **SELECT** button and follow the instructions onscreen. The source name “iPod” will be displayed in place of “Source 4” in the list of sources. Otherwise, press the selection control down to display **No** and press the **SELECT** button.

- The AADS will then prompt you to install an AAS. To install an AAS, press the **SELECT** button and follow the instructions onscreen. The source names will be renamed as follows:

- ⇒ Source 1 becomes “Server 1”
- ⇒ Source 2 becomes “Server 2”^{1,2}
- ⇒ Source 3 becomes “Server 3”²

- 1: If an AAS-2 model is detected
- 2: If an AAS-4 model is detected

If a CEN-IDOC is not configured and an AAS-4 is installed, Source 4 becomes “Server 4”.

If you do not want to add an AAS, press the selection control down to display **No** and press the **SELECT** button.

- To cancel and return to the Installer Tools menu, press the **MENU** button.

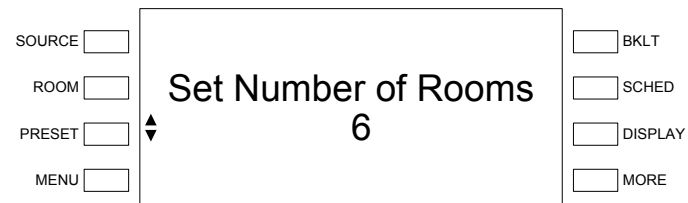

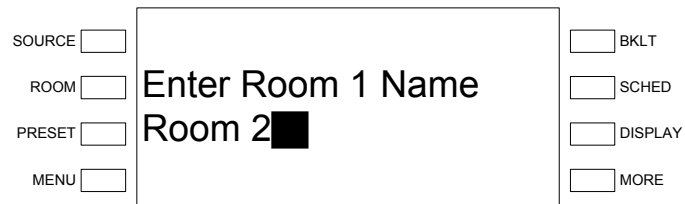

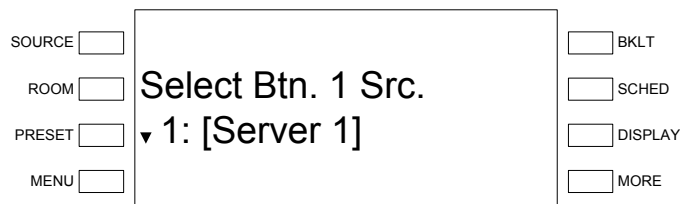

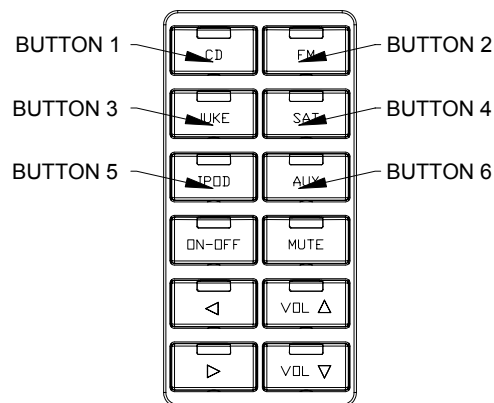

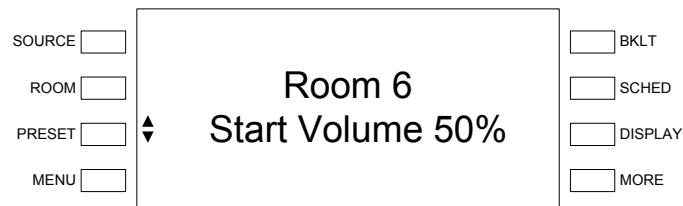

The startup volume establishes the volume level setting for a room when a room is turned on. The startup volume settings of each room can be adjusted independently.

- Access the Room Setup mode as described on page 31.
- Press down on the selection control until **Start Volume** is displayed and press **SELECT** to open the Startup Volume control. The current startup volume setting is displayed.

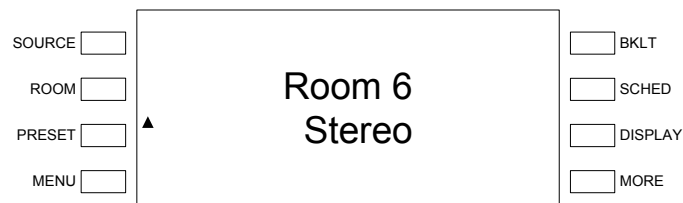
Startup Volume Control

- Adjust the maximum volume with the selection control. Press up to raise the maximum volume or press down to lower the maximum volume. The maximum startup volume setting is 50%.
- Press **SELECT** to store the startup volume setting and to return to the Room Setup menu.

Set Mono or Stereo Mode

The audio sent to the speakers in each room can be set for either stereo or mono. When set to stereo, the audio signal is separated into left and right channels for distribution to left and right speakers. When set to mono, the audio signal is combined into one signal for use in larger rooms where stereo separation is not practical. The mono/stereo settings of each room can be adjusted independently.

- Access the Room Setup mode as described on page 31.
- Press down on the selection control until **Stereo/Mono** is displayed and press **SELECT** to open the Stereo/Mono control. The selected mode is displayed on the LCD.

Stereo/Mono Control

- To select stereo, press the selection control down to display **Stereo** and press **SELECT**.
- To select mono, press the selection control up to display **Mono** and press **SELECT**.
- To cancel and return to the Room Setup menu, press the **MENU** button.

Configure Presets

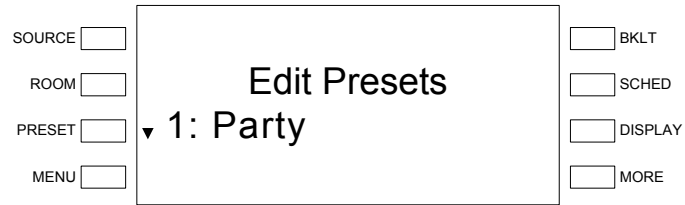
Presets can be created to group speakers in adjacent rooms with a specified source, or switch into a whole-house “party” mode, by letting the user link a source with any number of rooms. Changing the source in any one room changes the source in all of the rooms in the preset.

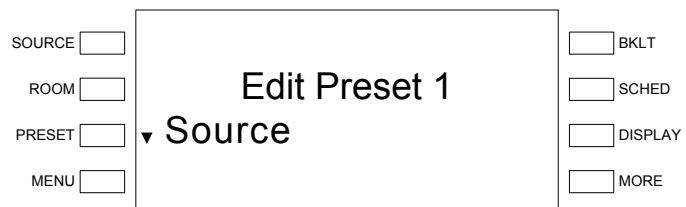

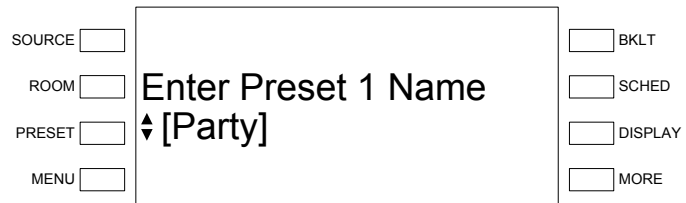

Operating the AADS is broken down into four modes:

Source Mode

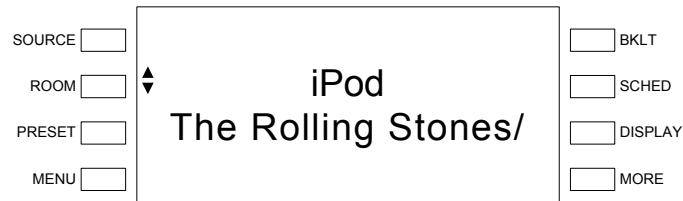
Source mode is used to select and control sources that are connected to the AADS. A selected source can also be routed to any room or rooms connected to the AADS or a connected AAE.

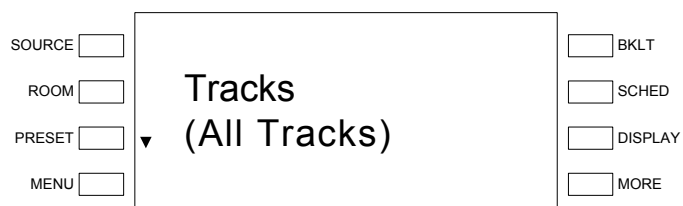

Rooms that are connected to the source are indicated on the room buttons.

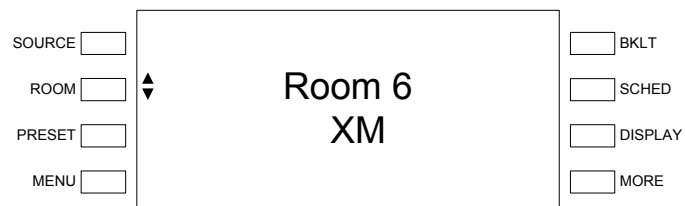

After a room is selected, a source can be selected, the room can be turned “off”, room and global volume can be adjusted, or the room output can be muted.

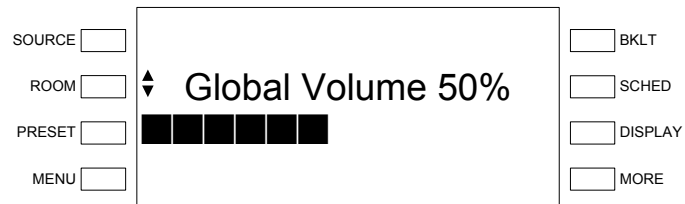
- Select a source by pressing the selection control up or down until the desired source is displayed on the LCD and pressing the **SELECT** button. Press the **MORE** button to view options for adjusting audio parameters (global volume, bass, treble, balance, and loudness).

- Turn off the room by pressing the room button.

Global Volume

The volume in all rooms can be adjusted from the global volume control. Adjusting the global volume adjusts the volume in every room that is currently turned on. The volumes are adjusted proportionately so the room volume levels do not jump to the same level when the global volume control is used.

- To open the global volume control, press the **MORE** button. The global volume level will be displayed on the LCD.
- Adjust the global volume by pressing up or down on the volume control. The global volume level will be displayed on the LCD. Press **MENU** to return to the room menu.

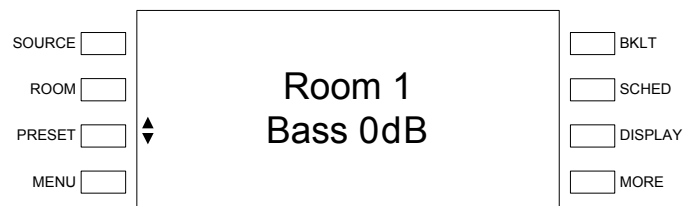
- Press the **SELECT** button to set the global volume level. If left untouched, the new level will be set and the display will return to the room mode.

Adjust the Bass

The bass level of each room can be adjusted independently.

- While in *Room* mode, press the **MORE** button twice.

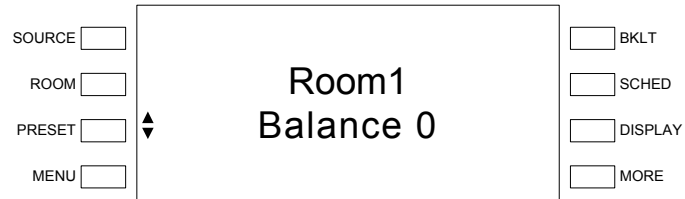

- While in *Room* mode, press the **MORE** button twice.
- Press the selection control down until **Balance** is displayed on the LCD.
- Press the **SELECT** button to open the balance control.

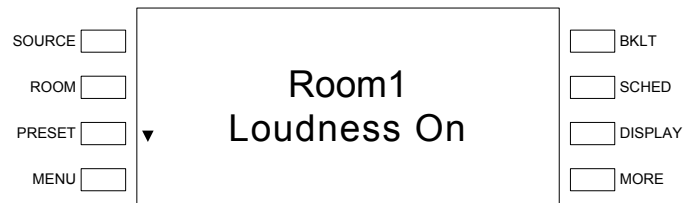

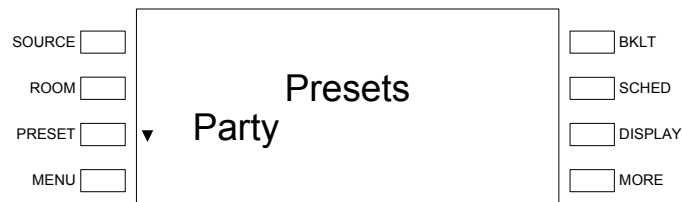

- Press **MENU** to save changes and return to the previous screen.

Recall a Preset Group

Press the **PRESET** button to open the Preset Control menu.

Preset Control Menu

- Scroll through the preset groups by pressing up or down on the selection control. Active preset groups are indicated with a *.
- To activate a preset group, use the selection control to find an inactive preset group and press the **SELECT** button. A * will appear next to the preset group name.

NOTE: If a room is shared by two or more preset groups, the source from the most recently activated preset group will be routed to all of the activated groups.

- To deactivate a preset group, use the selection control to find an active preset group and press the **SELECT** button. The * next to the preset name will disappear.

Turn off the System

Press **STANDBY** to turn off all of the rooms.

Programming Software

Refer to this section only if a custom program for the AADS is to be created.

A built-in program containing the out-of-the-box functionality resides in a protected area of the AADS' flash memory. The program cannot be erased and can be recalled at any time by holding the software reset button during a hardware reset.

The built-in-program cannot be modified using the tools described in this section.

Programming with Adagio Composer

To add additional Crestron sources, third-party sources, and interfaces use Adagio Composer. Adagio Composer is part of the Crestron SystemBuilder application which can be downloaded from the Crestron website.

Adagio Composer provides a quick method of configuring a custom audio distribution system without prior programming knowledge. For additional details,

download Adagio Composer from the Crestron website and examine the extensive help file.

To create more advanced systems that include non-audio distribution devices such as lighting and HVAC, use Crestron SystemBuilder or SIMPL Windows.

Programming with Crestron SystemBuilder

Crestron SystemBuilder is the easiest method of programming, but does not offer as much flexibility as SIMPL Windows. For additional details, download SystemBuilder from the Crestron website and examine the extensive help file.

Any program created for the AADS with SystemBuilder will include the out-of-the-box functionality in addition to any additional programming created with SystemBuilder.

Programming with SIMPL Windows

NOTE: While SIMPL Windows can be used to program the AADS, it is recommended to use Adagio Composer or SystemBuilder for configuring a system.

SIMPL Windows is Crestron's premier software for programming Crestron control systems. It is organized into two separate, but equally important "Managers".

Any SIMPL Windows program written for an AADS will contain all of the AADS' out-of-the-box functions in a protected area of the program. The parts of the program that contain the out-of-the-box functions are locked and cannot be changed or deleted. When a program is compiled, the custom program plus the out-of-the-box program's logic, default front panel operation, and control device (APAD or keypad) logic are loaded.

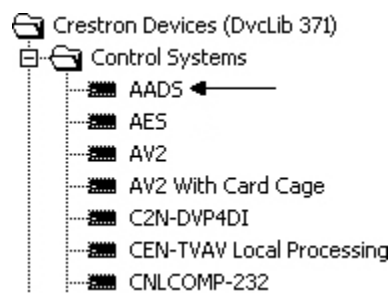
NOTE: When programming an AADS in SIMPL Windows, always begin with the example program as a program and modify as required. To find example programs, refer to "Example Program" on page 56. Also visit Crestron's True Blue Support on the web for more programming tips.

Configuration Manager

Configuration Manager is the view where programmers "build" a Crestron control system by selecting hardware from the *Device Library*.

- To incorporate the AADS into the system, drag the AADS from the Control Systems folder of the *Device Library* and drop it in the *System Views*.

Locating the AADS in the Device Library



Programming Manager

Programming Manager is the view where programmers "program" a Crestron control system by assigning signals to symbols.

Signals that are part of the AADS' out-of-the-box functionality are locked and cannot be modified or deleted. Locked signals are grayed out in the AADS' SIMPL Windows symbols. To prevent corruption of the out-of-the-box functionality, locked signal names should not be copied or driven to other destinations in the SIMPL Windows program.

The symbol can be viewed by double clicking on the icon or dragging it into *Detail View*. A description for each signal in the symbol is described in the SIMPL Windows help file (F1).

Example Program

An example program for the AADS is available from the Crestron website (<http://www.crestron.com/exampleprograms>).

Uploading and Upgrading

Crestron recommends using the latest programming software and that each device contains the latest firmware to take advantage of the most recently released features. However, before attempting to upload or upgrade, it is necessary to establish communication.

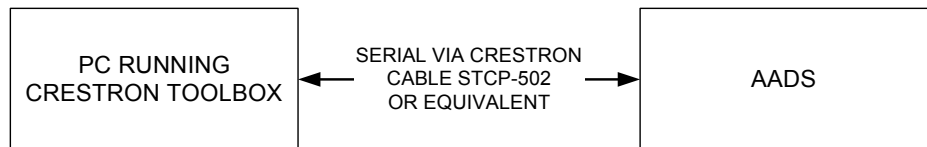
Establishing Communication


Use Crestron Toolbox for communicating with the AADS; refer to the Crestron Toolbox help file for details. There are two methods of communication.

Direct Serial Communication

NOTE: Serial Communication must be used for initial setup of Ethernet parameters when the out-of-the-box functionality is not used.

Direct Serial Communication

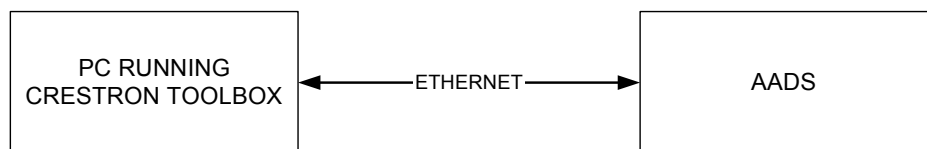


- The **COMPUTER** port on the AADS connects to the serial port on the PC via the included serial cable (Crestron STCP-502 or equivalent).
- Use the Address Book in Crestron Toolbox to create an entry using the expected serial communication protocol (RS232, auto-detect baud rate, no parity, 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, XON/XOFF disabled, RTS/CTS enabled).
- Display the AADS' "System Info" window (click the  icon); communications are confirmed when the device information is displayed.

TCP/IP Communication


NOTE: A connection to an Ethernet network is required for operation with a CEN-IDOC, AAS, or any other TCP/IP enabled device.

Ethernet Communication



- Establish direct serial communications between the AADS and PC.
- Enter the IP address, IP mask, and default router of the AADS via Crestron Toolbox (**Functions | Ethernet Addressing**); otherwise enable DHCP.

NOTE: When taken out of the box, the AADS is configured for DHCP operation. If a DHCP server is available and the AADS is connected to the network, the IP address can be obtained from the *About* screen as described on page 30.

- Confirm Ethernet connections between the AADS and PC. If connecting through a hub, use CAT5 straight through cables with 8-pin RJ-45 connectors. Alternatively, Use a CAT5 crossover cable to connect the two LAN ports directly, without using a hub.
- Use the Address Book in Crestron Toolbox to create an entry for the AADS with the AADS' TCP/IP communication parameters.
- Display the “System Info” window (click the  icon) and select the AADS entry. Communications are confirmed when the device information is displayed.

Programs and Firmware

- The **Functions** menu displays a list of actions that can be performed on the AADS:
 - ⇒ Upgrade firmware
 - ⇒ IP Table
 - ⇒ SIMPL Program
- Upload the SIMPL Windows file to the AADS using SIMPL Windows or Crestron Toolbox.
- Upload the VisionTools Pro-e file to the AADS using VisionTools Pro-e or the Crestron Toolbox.
- Upgrade AADS firmware via Crestron Toolbox.
 - ⇒ Establish serial or TCP/IP communications with the AADS.
 - ⇒ Select **Functions | Firmware...** to upgrade the AADS firmware.

For details on uploading and upgrading, refer to the SIMPL Windows help file, VisionTools Pro-e help file, or the Crestron Toolbox help file.

Check Network Wiring**Use the Right Wire**

In order to ensure optimum performance over the full range of your installation topology, Crestron Certified Wire, and only Crestron Certified Wire, may be used. Failure to do so may incur additional charges if support is required to identify performance deficiencies because of using improper wire.

Calculate Power

CAUTION: Use only Crestron power supplies for Crestron equipment. Failure to do so could cause equipment damage or void the Crestron warranty.

CAUTION: Provide sufficient power to the system. Insufficient power can lead to unpredictable results or damage to the equipment. Please use the Crestron Power Calculator to help calculate how much power is needed for the system (<http://www.crestron.com/calculators>).

When calculating the length of wire for a particular Cresnet run, the wire gauge and the Cresnet power usage of each network unit to be connected must be taken into consideration. Use Crestron Certified Wire only. If Cresnet units are to be daisy-chained on the run, the Cresnet power usage of each network unit to be daisy-chained must be added together to determine the Cresnet power usage of the entire chain. If the unit is home-run from a Crestron system power supply network port, the Cresnet power usage of that unit is the Cresnet power usage of the entire run. The wire gauge and the Cresnet power usage of the run should be used in the following equation to calculate the cable length value on the equation's left side.

Cable Length Equation

$$L < \frac{40,000}{R \times P}$$

Where: L = Length of run (or chain) in feet
 R = 6 Ohms (Crestron Certified Wire: 18 AWG (0.75 MM²))
 or 1.6 Ohms (Cresnet HP: 12 AWG (4 MM²))
 P = Cresnet power usage of entire run (or chain)

Make sure the cable length value is less than the value calculated on the right side of the equation. For example, a Cresnet run using 18 AWG Crestron Certified Wire and drawing 20 watts should not have a length of run more than 333 feet. If Cresnet HP is used for the same run, its length could extend to 1250 feet.

NOTE: All Crestron certified Cresnet wiring must consist of two twisted pairs. One twisted pair is the +24V conductor and the GND conductor and the other twisted pair is the Y conductor and the Z conductor.

Strip and Tin Wire

When daisy-chaining Cresnet units, strip the ends of the wires carefully to avoid nicking the conductors. Twist together the ends of the wires that share a pin on the network connector, and tin the twisted connection. Apply solder only to the ends of the twisted wires. Avoid tinning too far up the wires or the end becomes brittle. Insert

the tinned connection into the Cresnet connector and tighten the retaining screw. Repeat the procedure for the other three conductors.

Add Hubs

For larger networks (i.e., greater than 28 network devices), it may become necessary to add a Cresnet Hub/Repeater (CNXHUB) to maintain signal quality throughout the network. Also, for networks with lengthy cable runs, it may be necessary to add a Hub/Repeater after only 20 devices.

Appendix: RDS/RBDS Function Support

Many radio stations transmit additional information, such as traffic information, radio text, real time clock etc., with their regular FM programming. The FM tuner contains circuitry that retrieves this information.

The US format for such information is called the Radio Broadcast Data System (RBDS), and in Europe this format is called the Radio Data System (RDS). There are some differences between the US and European standards.

The tables in this appendix describe information included in the standard.

This information can be viewed on APAD devices that are connected to the AADS.

RDS/RBDS Supported Feature Overview

FEATURES	DESCRIPTION
Program type name (PTY)	There are 31 program types such as jazz, classic etc. Each station that supports RDS will report its program type. (Refer to program type list following this table.)
Program service name (PS)	The station reports its service name such as WIRL, KTU etc.
Program type additional Info (PTYN)	The station sometimes will report additional information about its program type. For example, a program type "Sport" station may report a PTYN of "Football".
Radio text display support (RT)	The station will report radio text information such as phone numbers, artist, song, stations name, etc., in this field. This field could be either 32 or 64 characters.
Universal real time clock (UTC)	Some stations transmit the universal time clock year, month, day, hour, minute, and GMT offset.
Traffic information report (TA/TP)	The stations that support the traffic information.
Station search by TA, TP or TA&TP traffic information types	The FM Tuner can search for stations, which either broadcast or know about other stations that transmit the traffic information. TA = This station has information about other station which carries the traffic announcements. TP = This station broadcasts traffic announcements, but none is being broadcasted right now. TA&TP = This station is currently broadcasting the traffic announcements.
Station search by PTY	The FM Tuner is able to search for station with specified program type.
